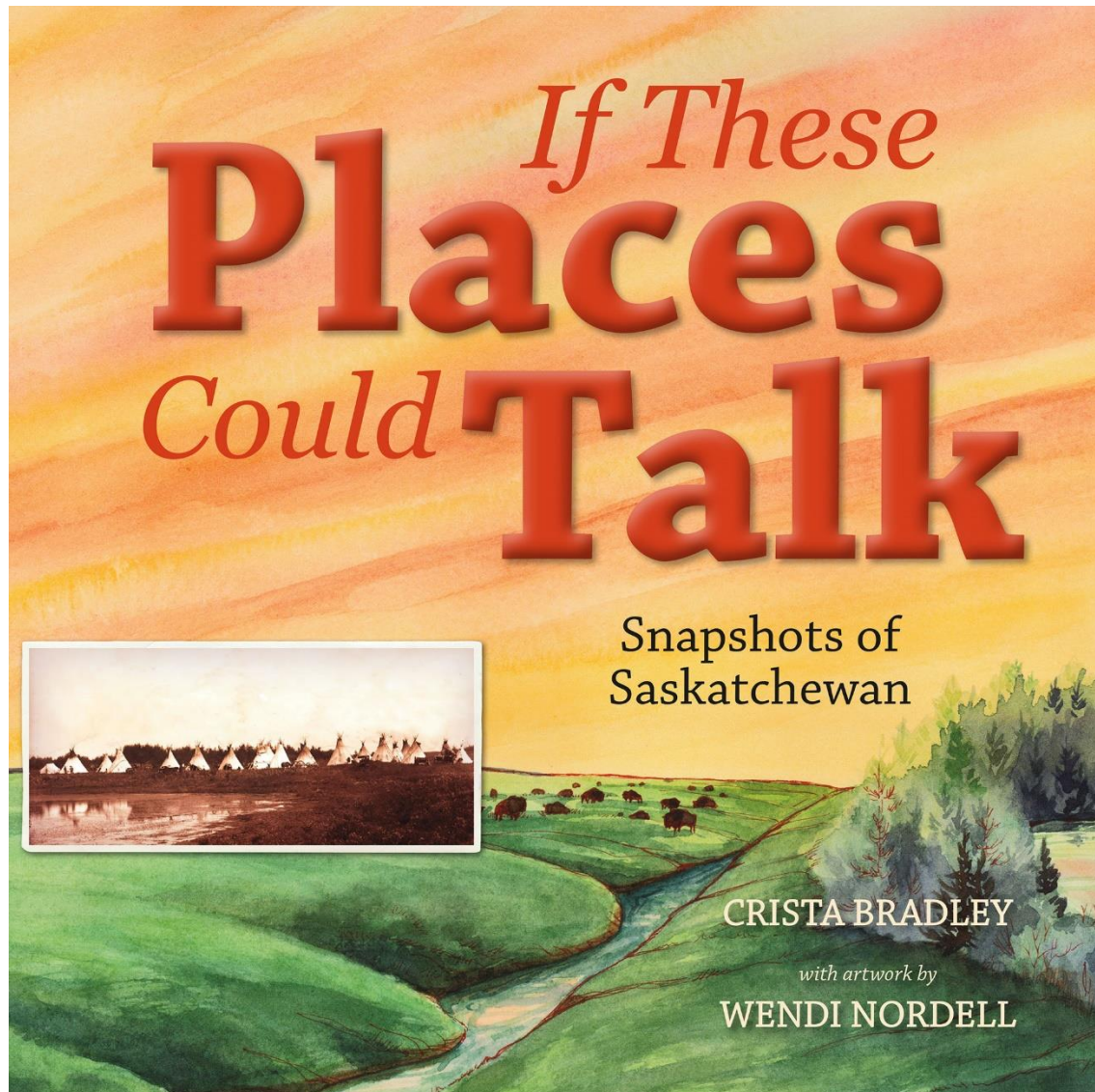

The pages are connected by a poem that leads readers through the ten thematic areas of the book.
